

Adalberto Mainardi is a monk of the Monastic community of Bose, Italy. He is a member of the Scientific Committee for the 'International Conferences on Orthodox Spirituality' held annually at Bose, and also of the *Saint Irenaeus Joint Orthodox-Catholic Working Group*. He has published many articles on Orthodox Theology and ecumenism. His books include *'Together Towards Unity'*, *'The Monastic Experience and the Ecumenical Journey'*, and *'The Ages of the Spiritual Life'*.

Father Alexander Fostiropoulos came to England from Greece in 1971 and trained as an architect in London. He served as deacon for five years under Metropolitan Anthony and as one of his priests in London, from his ordination by him in 1985 until Metropolitan Anthony's death in 2003. Since 1985 he has also been the Orthodox Chaplain at King's College London and at the London School of Economics and Political Sciences. For the last 11 years he has been the Rector of the new parish of St Peter and Paul, Clapham in South London, (Deanery of Great Britain and Ireland, Archdiocese of Orthodox Parishes of Russian Tradition in Western Europe, Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople.)

Elisabeth Robson's studies in Oxford, Paris and Leningrad (now St Petersburg) led to MA and DPhil degrees, after which she joined the BBC Russian Service and began a career in journalism and broadcasting. Positions held in the World Service included deputy features editor in the Russian Service, first head of the new BBC Ukrainian Service, Regional Editor and head of the Russian Service. At different times she produced and oversaw the religious programme for the Russian Service. She now works freelance as a media consultant on the countries of the former Soviet Union.

Karin Greenhead is a musician, teacher and specialist in Dalcroze Eurhythmics working nationally and internationally with musicians and dancers in professional training. Her particular field of interest both professionally and philosophically is incarnation and embodiment. She has presented at conferences on both music and dance, has published in a number of journals and has for many years been closely involved, both as speaker and chair, in the conferences of the Diocese of Sourozh, the Deanery of Great Britain and Ireland (Ecumenical Patriarchate), the Metropolitan Anthony Foundation (UK and Russia) and Manchester University.

Rowan Williams, the 104th Archbishop of Canterbury, is currently Master of Magdalen College at the University of Cambridge, and Chancellor of the University of Wales. His publications include *A Silent Action: Engagement with Thomas Merton*; *Silence and Honeycakes: The Wisdom of the Desert*; *Faith in the Public Square*; *Tokens of Trust: An Introduction to Christian Belief*; *Teresa of Avila* and *The Dwelling of the Light: Praying with Icons of Christ*.

Metropolitan John of Pergamon is a world-renowned representative of Eastern Orthodox theology and of the Greek Orthodox Church. He has taught theology in the Universities of Edinburgh, Glasgow, Thessalonica and King's College London, and is celebrated for his theology of the human person. He plays a prominent part in international ecumenism and is President of the Commission of the Orthodox in dialogue with the Roman Catholic Church. His publications include: *Being as Communion*; *Communion and Otherness*; and *Remembering the Future*.

Costa Carras studied philosophy and ancient history at Oxford and economics at Harvard, after which he worked for many years in shipping in London. He now lives in Athens. He has extensive experience in a wide range of issues including conservation and ecology, religion, culture and politics. He was founder in 1972 with his wife Lydia, and president for many years, of Greece's leading environmental organization, Elliniki Etairia; and is the longest-serving Vice-President of Europa Nostra, the federation of European conservation organizations. He was co-chairman of the British Council of Churches' Commission on Trinitarian Doctrine in the 1980s, and organized the ground-breaking 1988 meeting on religion and the environment in Patmos as a lay Archon of the Ecumenical Patriarchate. From 1978 to 1999, he served on the Assembly of the Diocese of Sourozh under Metropolitan Anthony, and co-edited with Andrew Walker *Living Orthodoxy in the Modern World*. He is a founding - and still active - member of Friends of Cyprus in London and the Center for Democracy and Reconciliation in Southeast Europe.

Susanne Sklar teaches at Carthage College in Kenosha, Wisconsin and is a member of the Cumnor Fellowship, Oxford, where she lectures and writes. She has a D.Phil from Oxford in theology and has taught literature, religion, and theatre in Russia, China, Sweden, and England - as well as at Northwestern University, Carthage, and Shimer College in America. Her many academic publications include her book *Blake's 'Jerusalem' as Visionary Theatre*. Additionally she has been a peace researcher, an activist, and a retreat leader exploring how beauty can save the world.
